surviving human anatomy preparations in the world

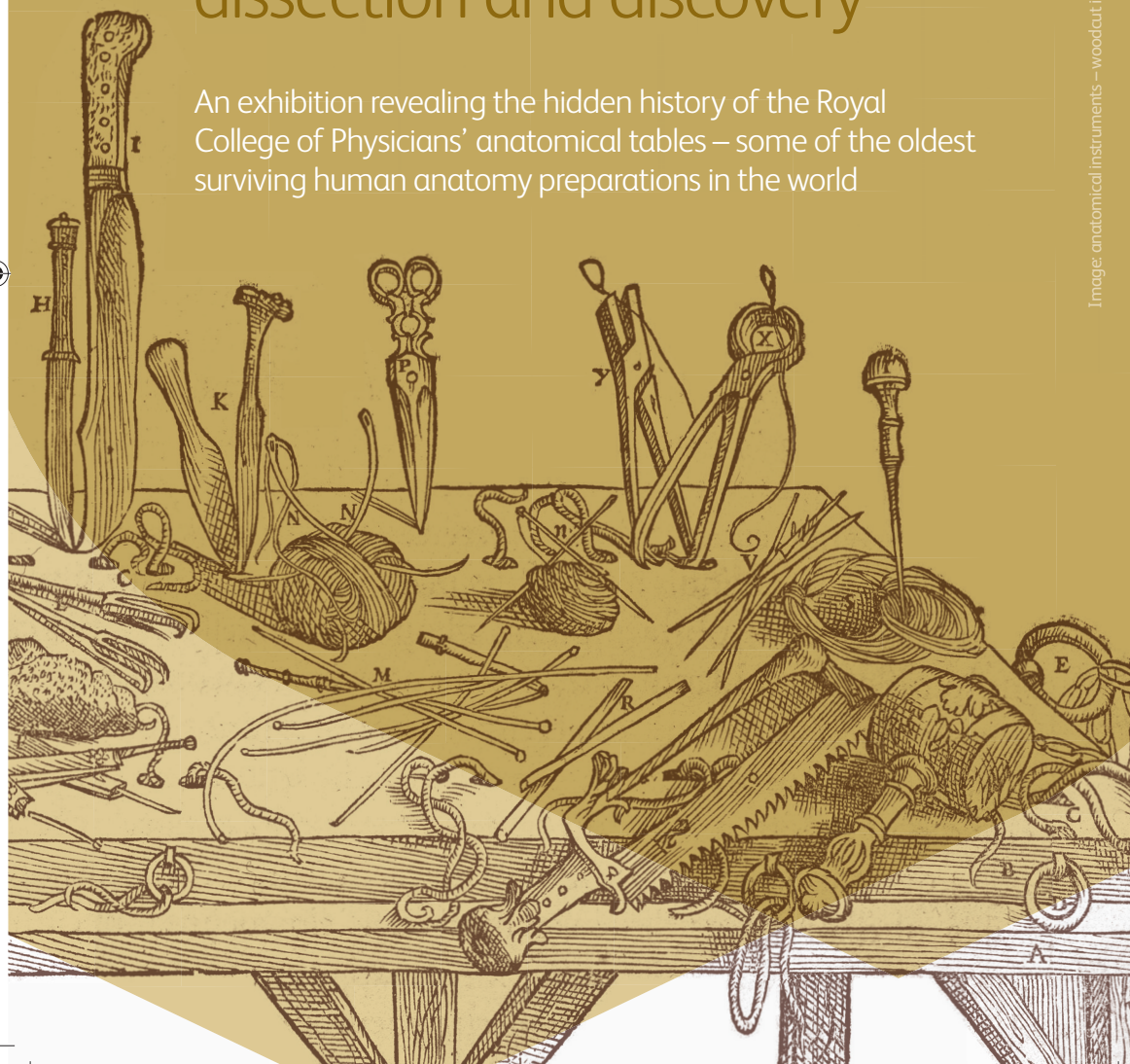


Image: anatomical instruments – woodcut illustration, *On the fabric of the human body*, Andreas Vesalius, 1543.



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‘Curious anatomys’: an extraordinary story of dissection and discovery

The Royal College of Physicians holds a rare set of six anatomical tables. The tables are visually spectacular – displaying human veins, nerves and arteries dissected at the University of Padua’s famous anatomy theatre in the 17th century, skilfully arranged on to wooden panels, recreating the systems in the body.

For the first time in their history, the tables are on full public display, alongside beautifully illustrated, rare anatomy texts by Andreas Vesalius and William Harvey and loans from the Hunterian Museum at the Royal College of Surgeons, The Gordon Museum of Pathology, and Christ’s College, Cambridge.
